

Modern

Stemming from the modernism movement, distinguishing features of modern design are neutral palettes with clean lines, furniture with exposed legs and often reflective surfaces are a feature.









Main materials: Wood, metal, glass, steel

Colour palette: Monochromatic, neutral, earthy

Furniture style: Simple, exposed legs, raised off the floor, glossy cabinets

Distinguishing features: Clean lines, simple furnishings, lack of clutter & adornments, "form follows function"





Contemporary

Current trends are incorporated within contemporary design, these include open and airy spaces which are created by the use of light wood, neutral colours and natural materials, creating an effortless look.



Main materials: Light woods, glass, stainless steel

Colour palette: Brown, taupe, cream, white, black

Furniture style: Exposed legs, neutral tones, natural fibres,

two-tone prints, no skirts or excess fabric

Distinguishing features: Open space, uncluttered, airy, strong

emphasis on line and form





Transitional

The balance between modern and traditional within transitional design allows for a finish which will last through some time.

Key pieces of modern design such as simple furniture and neutral palette works well with the bold elements of traditional design.



Colour palette: Neutral – brown, taupe, tan, cream, grey

Furniture style: Curves combined with straight lines, lacquered finishes, modern fabrics, subtle prints & patterns

Distinguishing features: Lightly adorned, clean lines, inviting, focus wall, neutral colours














Traditional

abundant accessories



Classic

Distinguishing features: Symmetrical, columns, crown moulding, detailed woodwork



Mid-Century Modern


The contrast found within midcentury modern design is created through the use of straight lines together with organic curves.

The style does not lack in colour and brings in many points of interest with iconic pieces from the past, bold fixtures and rich wood.









Colour palette: Neutral, bold, graphic

Furniture style: Vintage, wooden, sleek, statement

Distinguishing features: Juxtaposition, straight lines, organic shapes,

nature indoors, minimal ornamentation





Country

Wooden beams and stone walls are a perfect combination to create a rustic country feel within any space.

Distressed wood and rough edges add to the imperfect finish strived for.

Greens, beige and greys are often used together with organic textures to add subtle interest in country spaces.







Main materials: Wood, stone, organic textures

Colour palette: Neutral, green, grey, beige

Furniture style: Distressed/rough wood, leather, rough edges

Distinguishing features: Wooden beams, stone fireplace/accent wall, warm colours, natural materials, wooden counters and furniture, worn finishes



Bohemian

Layers of bold personal pieces combined with a relaxed colour palette create balance.

Plenty natural light together with plants provides a calming fresh space.







Main materials: Wood, fabrics, metals

Colour palette: Neutral, taupe, tan, cream, pops of multi-colour, botanical green

Furniture style: Traditional

Distinguishing features: Woven pieces, layering, colourful patterend soft

furnishings, botanicals, vintage pieces







French Country

Traditional and classic style furniture is incorporated within these spaces.

Distressed woodwork, ruffles, mixed patterns and neutral hues bring together the elegent yet effortless look of French Country design.







Main materials: Wood, metal, fabrics

Colour palette: Neutral, cream, soft green/blue,

Furniture style: Distressed wood, weathered metal, classic style curves

Distinguishing features: Distressed wood, aged metal, curved shapes, neutral soft

furnishings, natural materials



Urban

Sleek steel combined with weathered brick and exposed ceilings create a downtown look without having to be in a city.

Artwork is a key factor of bringing personality into Urban design.









Colour palette: Neutral shades – brown, tan, black, cream, grey, pops of colour

Furniture style: Mix of wood and metal, clean lines, weathered wood and leathers, functional

Distinguishing features: Artwork, open concept layout, high ceilings, exposed materials, uncluttered, functional, mix of old and new, negative space







Minimalist

An open space with as little furniture as possible is key to a minimalist look.

A fresh, monochromatic palette and clean lines allows for a fresh atmosphere.

Neutral materials like concrete, marble and wood bring in interest while keeping the overall look calm.



Main materials: Glass, wood, marble, concrete, metal

Colour palette: Monochromatic, white, black, grey

Furniture style: Streamlined shapes, simple, functional, subdued colors

Distinguishing features: Clean lines, uncluttered, lack of ornamentation, calm, spacious, airy, lots of light









Industrial

Neutral shades and materials of industry such as brick and concrete, metals and woods all create the unique style.

The suspended wire exposed lighting creates drama while being balanced by the weathered look of the materials used.







Main materials: Weathered wood, metal, brick, concrete

Colour palette: Neutral shades – brown, tan, black, cream, grey

Furniture style: Mix of wood and metal, vintage/antique look, weathered, functional

Distinguishing features: Open concept layout, high ceilings, exposed materials, uncluttered, functional, mix
